# CHAPTER ONE INTRODUCTION

## 1.1 Background

The 2020 Annual Progress Report is the assessment of activities that were undertaken in the year in the district and the challenges encountered in the implementation of the planned activities. This is the third assessment of the implementation of the Agenda for Jobs: Creating Equal Opportunities for All 2018-2021. This report outlines the activities that seeks to achieve the objective of the policy document Agenda for Jobs which was the basis of the Medium Term Development Plan 2018-2021. This report emanates from the implementation of the departmental action plans of the departments of the assembly. The assembly was able to implement ninety (90) percent of the 2020 Annual Action Plan and sixty-eight (68) percent of the 2018-2021District Medium Term Development Plan. There are difficulties in achieving the stated objectives at the end of the planned period especially with the physical projects. A number of projects have been commenced under the District Assembly Common Fund but their completion will largely depend on the frequency of the release of the fund and the quantum.

## 1.2 Purpose of the M&E Report for the stated period

The focus of this report is to measure the level of achievement of the targets set by the Afigya Kwabre District Assembly within the year under review. We look at the actual achievement of the various departments as against the planned activities within the year. The twenty core indicators will also be measured here to see how feasible their implementations are at the district level since this is the second year of its implementation.

#### 1.3 Processes involved in its implementation and the difficulties encountered

This report is compiled and submitted by the district planning coordinating unit through its secretariat.it is the collated report of the departments of the assembly. It is a combination of both primary and secondary data. The secondary data are derived from the quarterly and annual reports of the departments of the Assembly.

Challenges encountered during the preparation of the report include the following;

- Inadequate logistical and other resources to conduct regular monitoring of projects and programmes
- Submission of inadequate data by departments
- Delays in submission of departmental reports
- Unreliable data in some cases
- Failure of some departments and units to submit their reports

#### **NCCE**

#### 2.3.1 ANALYSIS ON SOME OF THE TWENTY CORE INDICATORS

**Electricity**: With the exception of two communities (Mposu and Dumakyi) in the district that are not connected to the national grid all other communities have been connected. The district is one of the fastest growing districts in the region and the new developments in the existing communities are not connected to the national grid. Peopling living in such extended areas usually called the new sites are prone to robbery attacks because the areas are usually dark due to luck of electricity. When planning for connection to the national grid such communities should be considered.

Water: About ten (10) percent of communities in the district benefit from pipe borne water from Ghana Water Company. The rest of the communities rely on bore holes and other sources of water for drinking and other household chores. Even though there are bore holes in almost all the communities they are not enough to cater for the water needs of the people. The district has an estimated population of 122,492 in 2020 and total number of 195 bore holes. Going by the standard of 300 people per one borehole the district will need not less than 408 bore holes to be able to serve the water needs of the people.

**National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS):** The data of NHIS has been captured under the critical development and poverty issues due to the nature of it. They submitted raw data and not segregated by sex and cannot easily fit into the core indicator format. Units that find it difficult to meet the data requirement should be targeted in your next review workshop.

# CHAPTER THREE THE WAY FORWARD

### 3.1 Key issues addressed and those yet to be addressed

The progress report looked at Annual Action Plans of the various departments which include programmes and projects. The issues addressed where mostly the day to day activities of the departments which include trainings, monitoring, organisation of meetings, and preparation of plans among others. In terms of physical projects, those projects that are financed by District Assembly Common Fund –Responsiveness Factor Grant (DACF-RFG) are almost completed. In other words projects that are financed by the District Assembly Common Fund are behind the schedule completion dates due to too many projects being financed by the fund.

#### Recommendations

National Development Planning Commission should relook at the date for the submission of progress reports especially the annual one. Some of the departments especially Health Service is not able to meet the dead line which tend to affect the compilation and submission of the Annual Progress Report.

## **Department of Agriculture**

The District Directorate of Agriculture complain that Donor funds should be released on time to carry out agricultural activities, especially the time-bound ones.

Most of the farmers' plant before the inputs under the PFJ are supplied. Majority of the farmers are not enthused. The inputs should be released early.

## **Works Department**

- Management should provide strong vehicle for field officers
- Management should provide protective clothing for field officers

#### **Education Directorate**

 T & T and allowances for SISOs' and trekking officers should be released on time to facilitate monitoring visits to schools

#### **NADMO**

- Special attention should be given to the DVGs by the National Office by providing them
  with equipment such as wellington boots, cutlass and protective clothes among others to
  motivate them
- A means of transport (motor bikes) should be provided to the Zonal Coordinators by the National Office to ease their work
- The Secretariat should be provided with enough funds, vehicle and furniture to enhance its operations

### **BAC**

- We recommend to management to provide enough office furniture to uplift the image of the BAC, as office that provides business solutions to challenged businesses to recover.
- We appeal to our financiers to finance the work plan as it will provide solutions to some of the needs of our clients
